WHAT IS ENTREPRENEURSHIP WITH A PURPOSE?

An **entrepreneur** is an initiator who takes risks to solve market problems. The initiator is someone who assumes the risk to begin a project, usually a business or enterprise, that solves a market problem. Although entrepreneurs are typically known for initiating businesses, someone can be an initiator within an existing organization.

Entrepreneurship with Purpose is taking the risks to initiate an enterprise or a project with the goal of positively impacting lives and transforming communities. It is doing business for the common good and not just for personal gain.

DEVELOPING YOUR LIFE PURPOSE STATEMENT

"Efforts and courage are not enough without purpose and direction." – John F. Kennedy

What is a life purpose statement?

Everything was created for a reason and exists for that reason. Anything that functions outside of its purpose will malfunction or be abused. A life purpose statement is an **articulation of the reason why you were created**. It is why you exist.

Why is a life purpose statement necessary?

- It serves as a guide to ensure that the projects and activities you embark upon have meaning and are consistent with who you are.
- It ensures that you do not misuse yourself and others do not abuse you.
- It ensures that life is fulfilling and meaningful.

In order to be an entrepreneur with purpose you must know and be committed to realizing your life purpose through your business. **Business is one of the tools through which your life purpose can be realized but is not an exclusive tool**.

How do you develop a life purpose statement? Start by answering the following questions:

- What are you most passionate about?
- What brings you the greatest joy and fulfillment?
- How would you like to be remembered?
- What issues and problems burdens your heart?
- What trials and tests have shaped who you are today?
- What can you do best? What are you naturally gifted at?
- Review your family heritage to identify elements that speaks to your heart and connects with your passion and gifts.
- Ask others who know you well for their opinion on some of these questions.
